

So You Like Harry Potter...



Amari and the Nightbrothers - B.B. Alston




Percy Jackson and the Olympians The Lightning Thief - Rick Riordan


Aru Shah and the End of Time - Roshani Cokshi


The Last Fallen Star - Gracie Kim

Eragon - Christopher Paolini


